DAILY PRAYER FOR LIFE

(by St. John Paul 2) O Mary, bright dawn of the new world. Mother of the living. To you we entrust the cause of life. Look down, O Mother, upon the vast

numbers

Of babies not allowed to be born. Of the poor whose lives are made difficult. Of men and women victims of brutal violence.

Of the elderly and the sick killed by indifference or out of misguided mercy.

Grant that all who believe in your Son may proclaim the Gospel of life with honesty and love to the people of our time. Obtain for them the grace to accept that Gospel as a gift ever new. The joy of celebrating it with gratitude throughout their lives, and the courage to bear witness to it resolutely, in order to build, together with all people of good will, the civilisation of truth and love. To the praise and glory of God, the Creator and Lover of life

I had been teaching my 3 year old daughter the Our Father at bedtime for several evenings. She would repeat each line after me. Finally she decided to go solo. I listened with pride as she carefully pronounced each word, right up to the end of the prayer. "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us some email. Amen."

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<u>13th Sunday of</u> <u>Ordinary Time,</u> <u>Year A</u>

2 Kings 4. Psalm 88 **Romans** 6 Matthew 10. In the 1st Reading we heard how a certain woman urged Elisha to have a meal at her place. So whenever Elisha passed that way, he would stop there for a meal. The woman said to her husband: "Look, I am sure that this man who regularly passes our way, is a holy man of God. Let us make a small roof chamber with walls and put there for him a bed, a table, a chair and a lamp" so that Elisha could stay whenever he happened to pass that way.

One day when Elisha came there and lay on his bed, he asked his servant: "What may be done for the woman?" His servant answered: "Well, she has no son and her husband is old". Elisha said: "Call her". She came, stood at the door, and Elisha told her: "At this season, in due time, you shall embrace a son". She replied: "No, do not deceive me". The woman conceived and bore a son as Elisha had declared to her.

This story explains not just hospitality but representation. The woman who welcomed Elisha was actually welcoming the one who Elisha represented, the Lord God. When Elisha promised her a son, he spoke with the word of God.

This story shows exactly what Jesus is speaking about in today's Gospel. When speaking to his Apostles he said: "whoever welcomes you, welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me, welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet, will receive a prophet's reward". Matthew wants us to believe that it is just as rewarding to be on the supportive side of the sacred ministries as to be exercising them. We don't have to feel we have to do everything ourselves! St. Paul would say, it is O.K. to be part of the body; vou don't have to be a foot if vou are a hand This truth is best explained by a story: There was a young man from a poor country village who, after a great struggle, was ordained a priest. His helper in his days of study had been the village cobbler. The cobbler was a man of wide reading and deep thinking. On the day the young priest was ordained the cobbler said to him, 'It has always been my desire to preach the Gospel of Christ, but the circumstances of my life made it impossible. You are achieving what is close to my heart. I want you to promise me one thing - I want you to let me make your shoes for nothing - and I want you to wear them in the pulpit when you preach. Then I'll feel you are preaching the Gospel that I always wanted to preach standing in my shoes.' I think that all priests have had similar experiences in their lives: e.g. going to the barber who gives a priest a hair-cut free of charge, or going to the

doctor who said "we don't charge the clergy". Hospitality, as is preached in the first Reading and in the Gospel, is not a question of bed and breakfast and goodbye; it is a matter of opening our hearts to a visit of God who comes to us in the guise of a prophet, a stranger, the homeless. In the end it is God who is our guest ! In making others feel they belong, we are welcoming Christ and God the Father. Mother Theresa of Calcutta picking up the sick and the dying from the streets and seeing the face of God in each one - understood this saying in a dramatic way. For us it will be in making certain we do not 'shut the door' of our lives in the face of others in need. **Today's Gospel text is not easy** to hear or to listen to because it demands a response from us, a response that is sometimes difficult. We are not 'Sunday Christians'.

"Whoever does not take up his cross and follow me is not fit to be my disciple". Christian life demands some sacrifice (a dirty word in today's society) but we cannot be a follower/disciple without giving up some of our time or personal pleasures.. **Discipleship is simple** demanding. The following of Christ is not one thing among the many things we do each day. It should be at the core of our lives and the basis of the decisions we make. The Gospel today calls us, invites us, to a new and more meaningful life, as well as one that requires personal sacrifice.

When Jesus said, "follow me" he intended to go there before

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us. He did not ask anything that he himself was not ready to do. He asked us to follow him and there will be a cost to that discipleship just as was true in his life: his Passion and his Death.

"Whoever tries to gain his own life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will gain it". This is one of the paradoxes of Christian life. St. Francis said it well: 'it is in giving that we receive and in dying that we receive eternal life'. When we do sacrifice something that we are entitled to for the sake of the Gospel and in order to be of service to others, we receive so much back in so many other ways that are often a surprise to us.... joys we never imagined.
