Marian Prayers

- There are number of traditional prayers which in the past were learnt by heart and prayed from the hearts of Catholics both in personal and communal prayer.
 As we celebrate the feast of the Assumption it is helpful to re-communicate the beauty of this tradition using such prayers as the Hail Mary, Rosary, Memorare, Hail Holy Queen.
- In your own parish / school you might invite different ethnic and language groups to sing a Marian hymn this weekend.
- Perhaps parishes might take this opportunity to sing Bishop Pompallier's Mo
 Maria hymn written in Aotearoa New Zealand in 1842.

Mo Maria

Mō Maria āianei, ō tātou waiata, kia kaha rā tātou, kia nui te aroha.

Chorus:

Mō Maria āianei, ō tātou waiata, kia kaha rā tātou, kia nui te aroha.

Meaning: For Mary now, our songs. Let us be strong, let there be great love.

Aroha ki te Atua, aroha ki a Maria, i te rangi, i te whenua āke tonu, āke tonu.

Meaning: Love God, love Mary, in heaven and on earth, for ever and ever.
